Call to Order by Zoom Pro: 7:01 p.m.

**Instructions of the Meeting and confirmation of Quorum (Dave Hoey):** Quorum Met (79 members in good standing, 10 people or 10% of the membership attending.)

Motion to Approve the Agenda: Moved by Micheline Lane, seconded by Tara Beechey. There was no opposition, the motion was carried.

Motion to Approve the November 16, 2021, GM Minutes: Moved by Micheline Lane, seconded by Tara Beechey. There was no opposition, the motion was carried.

- **1. President's Report (Presented by David Hoey):** For the full report, please click <u>here.</u> Dave highlighted some important items on the report including:
  - a. **Board Members:** Some Board members who won't be returning next year who we want to acknowledge for their contributions and activity thank you to Dave, Tara, Ahmed and Kristen who will not be returning. Thank you to all volunteers, past and present.
  - b. **General Meetings Going Forward:** As a Board, have been talking about hosting hybrid meetings. We aren't there yet as a Board, are going to figure it out going forward need to get the technology there. Going to see how this year rolls out.
  - c. Committees: There has been a big push for individuals who aren't yet ready to step up on the Board, can potentially join a committee. We will be pushing the option to join a committee, if interested, reach out to board members to ask.
  - d. **Municipal Election:** "All Candidates" debate tonight, encouraging people to vote and do your homework and take part.
  - e. **Activities:** I want to acknowledge some events that have happened in the CCA this year. On Facebook, you can see all of the great events we had in the community, including the scavenger hunt, the plant and yard sale, Merry and Bright, Eid event.

- 2. **Councillor Riley Brockington's Update:** For the full report, please click <u>here</u>. Some highlights as provided by Councillor Brockington are below:
  - a. **Volunteering Community Association:** Serving on a community association is one of many ways to contribute back to your community. The CCA is strong as it has many volunteers giving back, and there are many people in Carlington who want to contribute.
  - **b. Development:** Councillor Brockington spoke to many development projects underway in Carlington, as highlighted on his report including:
    - i. **1435 Morisset Ave**: Proposal from company to build a 4-storey, 31-unit building, the Councillor is going to support it. During community consultations, some ongoing property standard issues. There are some chronic issues this builder has had previously that will need to be addressed.
    - ii. **1291 Summerville Ave**: Take down and rebuild a 3-storey building. Site plan only, no zoning needed.
    - iii. **1062/1066/1058 Silver Street:** City will host public consultations soon, proposal to rezone to take down 3 houses and replace with a three-storey building.
    - iv. **1110 Fisher Ave:** Community appeal was dismissed, not yet received a site plan application for this development. Do not see this process as being quick.
    - v. **1330 Carling/815 Archibald (Second Chance Auto):** Going to receive Section 37 benefits (\$250k) from this which will go to community gardens and traffic calming in Carlington. Have not yet filed a building permit.
    - vi. **Travelodge Phase 1 & 2:** Well under way, however a lot of work still to be done. Working to ensure safe passage for pedestrians.
    - vii. **1095** Merivale (Shepherds of Good Hope): That work is ongoing due to supply challenges.
    - viii. **Ottawa Ward Boundary:** As of November 15th, 2022, the boundaries of River Ward will change slightly and will include Westgate.
    - ix. Carlington North Veterans' Housing Heritage Report: Approved, and special guidelines will be created to guide homeowners on making changes or modifications to their homes. This does not currently apply restrictions, but provides guidance on changes and commemorates the heritage of the veteran houses in Carlington North.

## c. Infrastructure:

- i. Redesign of Kirkwood: Early August build, basically a green light while still some work to be done. If he is re-elected as City Councillor, by the end of 2023 he will run a survey in the neighborhood to get feedback from the community. Would like to see if the painted bike lanes can become a barrier.
- ii. **Lepage, Larose and Larkin Construction:** If you would like to see what is planned, please review the report, it's a full year of construction.
- iii. **Morisset Avenue Pump Station:** Looking at mitigating the impact on the community. Don't want heavy vehicles going down Caldwell due to the number of pedestrians and children in that vicinity. Asked the City to look at Morisset and put in a temporary traffic light there.



- 1. There will be a multi-use pathway detour, and need to ensure the butternuts are protected.
- iv. Alexander Community Centre Expansion: Still optimistic about the library coming to the Centre. The senior management at the Ottawa Public Library are challenged with completing a review of its Service Delivery Model as well as its Facilities Master Plan. Good work will still continue, there will be a public report that will be released this fall. The gym is finally being fixed, the structural issues will be solved, and it will be opened up again in July.
- v. Meadowvale Park: Future improvements coming to the park. Working with some residents to create community gardens and pollinator gardens. In this decade, the wading pool and play structure will need to be replaced, which is \$1M. Will be doing preliminary consultations in the community to confirm what we'd like to see in the park.
- vi. Carlington Park Community Garden Expansion: Improvements planned and approved for the expansion, just waiting on the money.
- vii. Harrold Place Park: Tribute to Linda Dodd in the form of a dedication of the new Gazebo.
- **viii. Raven Park:** 7 new trees to be added. Junior swing replaced for accessibility. Ottawa Markets are coming back 3 times this summer.
- ix. Merivale Path to Alexander Community Centre: The pathway appears to be private property; the ownership was with the landowner of the former gas station. Looking to see if we can have a right-of-way established on the park.
- x. Coming Events: Please see Riley's report.
- xi. Attended the grand reopening of the Carlington Community Health Centre.
- xii. Trent Street, Edgecliffe being replaced starting this summer, General Avenue sidewalks being replaced starting this summer, and Trent and Trenton streets will get speed bumps.

## **Questions from Attendees:**

**Member Question:** I saw the construction signs on Carling Avenue that are going to go from Merivale to Melrose. Didn't they try this last year, the repaying?

**Answer:** There are 20 arterial roads in the city, 4 in our ward, that they couldn't get to last year. We are back on the books this year for between Merivale and Melrose. It will be "Shave and Pave".

**Member Question:** I heard on the news that they are going to levy some special tax for the hospital for \$150M. Can you speak about this, provide more details on what this means for Ottawa residents?

**Answer:** The hospital is required to find \$700M to contribute to the \$2.8B price tag. The Ottawa Hospital Foundation is leading their contribution, and part of their strategy is to come to the City of Ottawa and ask for a contribution which they've determined should be \$150M. There is no provincial requirement on a municipality. Toronto Hospitals likely have the ability to engage in successful charitable campaigns, including from national organizations who contribute, so the City of Toronto doesn't historically contribute to them. Councillor Brockington's colleagues will direct their staff to undertake a review on how we could contribute \$150M which may include a special levy or tax. Riley strongly voted against it.

**Member Question:** Is the library uncertainty having an impact on the progress/timing of the overall redevelopment of the Alexander Community Centre?



**Answer:** The short answer is no. In the 2022 budget, I was able to get the city to identify \$8.5M, however as I haven't made the same progress with the library, being more reserved. The OPL Board has to give direction to Sr. Management, and when the report comes out in the fall, I will bring a motion forward at that time that says we are going to endorse this project even though it might not check off every metric, but we will recognize the unique opportunity of getting the gym given to us for free.


Member Follow Up Question: Do you have an idea of when the expansion will happen?

## **Community Grant:**

Budget line item called the CCA Grant. We've had 3 rounds of it so far. After the AGM and we set aside funds, we opened up a process to solicit ideas from the community for ideas to make a better, greener, safer Carlington. We've had ultimate frisbee, had art installations previously, and some very interesting



ideas for it. We'll put out a call for proposals and send out a simple grant application. In the past, the timeframe opens at the end of August and we'll rank them against a set of criteria, rank them, then bring back the successful applicant at the GM in September.

Two Art Installation applications. The first one was for Hydro Poles painted, and unfortunately Hydro Ottawa said no. The second one was another art installation at the end of Thames on the East side of Merivale. Have to do more consultation, and it's underway now. With that, we'll have further updates in the fall. Going to have the same thing going forward. Usually receive 5 or 6 proposals.
