Winter Updates at a glance

January

- Met with our National Capital Commission (NCC) and City partners to discuss 2025 plans and objectives for Hampton and Carlington
- Met with the City's waste department and contractors to arrange for new bins and bin locations at Carlington

February

- Applied for grants to fund projects in Hampton and Carlington
- With a network of other community groups, advocated for easier city processes for residents and groups to renaturalize areas, including in the right-of-way

March

- Met with a buckthorn management control group, and helped refine the 2025 plan for continuing buckthorn removal in Carlington
- Worked with City's water department on a plan to transplant staghorn sumac to Hampton Park as a result of the Carlington pumping station reconstruction.

Carlington and Hampton have many species of native sedges. They are some of the earliest plants to green up and provide important habitat for insect species, including pollinators. Many sedges are found along the edges of paths, where they can be easily admired but can just as easily be damaged by feet, bicycle tires, and paws.

Be good to the Woods!

- \boxdot Stay on the paths and don't make new ones.
- \square Go through puddles, not around them, to avoid trampling new vegetation.
- Keep dogs on leash and pick up their waste. Try not to let them pee on young plants and trees.
- Leave natural debris like sticks, leaves, and logs as habitat for the critters who live here.

- Watering / mulching/ weeding at the Staircase Garden and Clyde Bee & Butterfly Patch (May)
- Staghorn sumac to be moved from the reservoir area to Hampton for transplant (June)
- Dog strangling vine removal (June)

Hampton

- Invasive Japanese knotweed and periwinkle removal (April/May)
- Mulching / watering /weeding 2023 and 2024 planted trees/shrubs (April/May)
- ♥ Native wildflower planting (June)
- Staghorn sumac to be planted at Buell (June)
- ⑦ Dog strangling vine removal (June)
- ¹ 2nd "Soft Landings" project (summer)

Notices will be sent as events are scheduled. Volunteer with the group, or for invasive removal, receive training you so that you can do it whenever your schedule permits. We sign for student volunteer hours.
